1. Call to Order and Approval of Agenda

The meeting was called to order.

The Chair announced that the agenda had been modified to accommodate the President's schedule.

It was moved, seconded, and carried to approve the amended agenda.

2. Chair of Council's Remarks

The Chair welcomed members to the 67th meeting of Council. He introduced Rhonda Lenton.

3. Guest Speaker: Rhonda Lenton, President and Vice-Chancellor, York University The President thanked Council for inviting her to speak. She said that universities are encouraged to declare specializations as either a research intensive graduate school or an access based undergraduate school. She noted that York did both equally well and she identified five primary areas that she will focus on:

1) Reputation: She will work to uphold York's reputation and engage in positive reputation building

2) Enhancing community engagement: She will work to build a full time Faculty compliment and consider how to integrate full time and part time faculty.

3) Advance university academic priorities: Her focus will be to amplify scholarship, creativity and research. Experiential education would also be important as York must prepare students for work.

4) Markham campus: She will work toward a successful launch and this new campus will solidify us as York Region's university.

5) Glendon- She will support growth at the French only university.

Questions:

A member put up a slide with aspects that he felt were neglected, including a precarious teaching workforce, high student faculty ratios, budget model that commodified students, growing infrastructure deficit, and BOG representation in the Arts.

The President responded that LAPS may have felt neglected by the university's focus on growing Health, Science and Engineering but she was here to advocate on the fundamental importance on Liberal Arts for society. Some programs were experiencing declining enrollment so we needed to work to fix it. She highlighted the importance of providing students with the skill sets that they needed to be successful in different occupations. She acknowledged that there were gaps in BOG representation. She noted that the new budget model had brought millions of dollars to LAPS and flowed both to majors (60%) and service teaching (40%). She pointed out that infrastructure was the Faculty's responsibility and space was now on the university executive committee.

A member noted that SHARP budget had brought more money to the faculty but he wondered how much decision making power it had brought. What was the ability of Faculties to make decisions about how to use the revenue to acquire full time appointments? LAPS has lost 46 appointments (around 8%).

The President responded that people in lead positions in banking and government have Liberal Arts degrees. Those skill sets were needed but perhaps we needed to promote that. Yes, there was a need to increase full time faculty but it should be done creatively in order to underpin the best possible Faculty compliment plan for both tenure stream and teaching-stream.

A member asked if the President could speak more about reinvigorating the excitement and pride in Liberal Arts in the university both internally and externally.

The President noted the importance of accepting speaking engagements to talk about Liberal Arts and to see opportunities to elevate attention on Humanities and Social Science at York.

The Dean said that it was important to recognize all of the exciting directions of the work that the faculty was doing. LAPS was taking steps, even though the budget was enrolment driven. She highlighted that next year was LAPS' 10th year and she was considering what we could do. For example, we could hold a "festival of ideas," of talks, performances, discussions and bring our ideas to the public.

The President noted that the SHARP budget model should offer more autonomy and agency to the faculties to come up with plans that worked for them. The President's job was to offer oversight to make sure that a faculty's proposed compliment plan could work.

A member asked for an update on the Provost search.

The President responded that it was ongoing and a contract faculty member was added to the committee. She offered that they would interview in February and hopefully announce in March.

The Chair thanked the President for presenting. He invited the new CUPE members to Council and noted that a synopsis of the last senate meeting was in the Council package.

4. Minutes of the November 9, 2017 Meeting

It was moved, seconded, and carried to approve the minutes of the November, 9 2017 meeting. There was no discussion and the minutes were passed.

5. Business Arising from the Minutes

There was none.

6. Dean's Report to Council

The Dean reported that she had been interviewing students and making a podcast about student's voices. She said that students were anxious about getting a job after graduation. How could LAPS respond, particularly to racialized students, new immigrants, and ESL students, who were marginalized in the job market? How should we development a broad and holistic education that could empower students to deal with the current social reality? She noted that compliment renewal and infrastructure remained priorities. The discussion of space was also relevant to the new Markham campus, since 50% of that campus would be LAPS.

7. Question Period

A member asked if there was a way to renovate old buildings and then come from a different budgetary direction?

The Dean noted that we very well may be beyond renovations. We really needed more classroom space, office space and student space.

A member noted that professors in the Sociology department prepared a report about the generic skills crisis in LAPS. It examined the basic skills for citizenship and employment and found that students felt that they had not gained these skills at York.

A member noted that we already had a Modes of Reasoning course and we could make it a requirement for first year students.

A member noted that contract faculty provided 65% of course delivery at York and they were ready to take on more work.

A member asked why students were not often encouraged to use the facilities and resources already offered at York?

The Dean noted that it was not just an individual issue but a bigger structural issue.

A member asked what we were we doing about grad student space? He noted that in his department, 90 students shared four desks and two computers. He asked about child care space. Will the Markham campus include child care space?

The Dean said that in discussion of space, it was often only grad student space that was discussed and not undergraduate.

8. Reports of the Standing Committees of Council

a) Executive Committee

The Chair called upon the Vice-Chair to present the Executive Committee report.

R. lannacito-Provenzano gave an update on contract faculty elections. 18 contract faculty members were acclaimed and 24 spaces were filled (of 30).

A member spoke for the importance of contract faculty participation and asked if Executive could set aside some time in a future meeting to discuss how we could enhance the participation of contract faculty in planning and governance.

The Chair agreed to do this.

b) Curriculum, Curricular Policy and Standards

The Chair noted the consent agenda.

c) Committee on Teaching, Learning and Student Success

The Chair called upon S. Bohn. She noted that the committee examined why the Dean's Award for Excellence in Teaching excluded non-tenured faculty. LAPS was the only faculty that excluded probationary tenured stream members. Also, the committee decided to limit the amount of words to make sure that all of the application packages were consistent. A motion to approve these changes was put forward and seconded.

The member wondered if there was a conflict of interest for someone going up for a teaching award in the same year that he/she was up for tenure?

A member responded that the committee debated this issue and wondered if someone could use this award to boost his/her tenure and promotion file. The units nominated individuals and would need to be mindful of the applications they put forward.

A member noted that he was nominated for the award and received over 30 letters from students dating back 18 years but not all could be included.

S. Bohn responded that there was a way for a referee to note that 30 letters were there but only 6 could be included. The committee had to go through the material and needed to limit the length of the files.

A member wanted to know if a converted faculty member could count teaching years while not a full time faculty.

S. Bohn responded that it could be counted.

The motion carried unanimously.

There were no questions.

There was none.

It was moved second and passed to adjourn.

Committee on Research Policy and Planning Report

January 2018

ITEM FOR ACTION (1)

1. Motion: Minor Research Grant funds

Rationale:

In March of 2017, Faculty Council approved amendments to the Minor Research Grant guidelines which included adding an expiry date to the MRG due to the ongoing issue of outstanding research ethics approvals.

When an approved MRG application requires ethics clearance, the funds are not released until the applicant submits the ethics approval to the Faculty Council Office. In the past, some awards have gone unclaimed for years due to applicants' failure to submit ethics approval. These funds remain committed and cannot be allocated to new MRG applications, which contributes to the ongoing funding shortfall.

The current guidelines state that: 'Unclaimed MRG funds due to missing ethics approval will expire one year after you are notified of your application's success.'

The Committee on Research Policy and Planning suggests the one-year expiry be extended to cover all faculty who have received notices of awards since 2015 which required ethics approval. These faculty members will be contacted and given three months to submit their ethics claim to receive their funds, at which point the commitment to the funds will expire.

Motion:

The Committee on Research Policy and Planning proposes extending the expiry date of the MRG to all faculty members who were awarded the MRG prior to March 2017, so that the change approved in March 2017 will apply to them. Faculty members will be contacted and will have three months to submit their ethics claim to receive their funds, at which point the commitment to their funds will expire.

Reports of Standing Committees of Council

• **Curriculum, Curricular Policy and Standards** Item for Information: First term report

CCPS had a productive first term. From September to December 2017, we met 8 times (up from 6 times the year before) and reviewed 106 curricular proposals. Due to the high volume of material we received, members agreed to extend the regular meeting time from 2 to 3 hours, and to increase the frequency of meetings from monthly to every two weeks, as necessary.

Our approval rate for new courses (the main type of proposal that CCPS sees) is up 10% from last year at this time; we approved 74% of the new course proposals we saw last term, compared to 64% in 2016. The top reasons for sending a proposal back are –

- insufficient evidence of unit-level approval for the proposal
- lack of clearly stated prerequisites or course credit exclusions
- missing library and/or consultation statements
- lack of statement showing how the course aligns with the program learning outcomes
- lack of clarity in scope of course relative to the credit weighting

For assistance with developing new curriculum proposals, LA&PS faculty and staff are invited to attend the following curriculum workshops:

- Tuesday, February 13, 10am-12pm (Senate Chamber, Ross North 940)
- Thursday, March 22, 1-3pm (519 Kaneff Tower)

The first curriculum workshop on January 24 was well attended, with upwards of 30 LA&PS faculty taking part. Vice Provost Academic Alice Pitt spoke about quality assurance and clarified the need to align all new curriculum proposals with extant program learning outcomes. Curriculum Manager Kathryn Doyle then gave participants an overview of the curriculum review process.

The Chair would like to thank CCPS committee members, as well as Curriculum Manager Kathryn Doyle and Curriculum Assistant Manjula Kanwar, for all of their hard work this past fall.

Meeting Synopsis

The 640th Meeting of Senate held on Thursday, January 25, 2018

Remarks

The Chair of Senate, Professor Lesley Beagrie of the Faculty of Health, praised the organizers of Inclusion Day and expressed gratitude for the stimulating discussions involving participants at the event. She reminded Senators that January 31 is Let's Talk Day and encouraged them to help ensure the well-being of all members of the community.

The President of York University, Rhonda Lenton, devoted her remarks to a wide range of subjects including the following:

- the sad passing of Barry and Honey Sherman, true friends of York who funded the research centre bearing their family name
- the auspicious opening of York's two subway stations with its attendant opportunities to further expand connections to the Greater Toronto Area
- the success of a pilot program housed in the Faculty of Liberal Arts & Professional Studies' School of Sociology providing a bridge to university study for youth who have precarious immigration status (for which long-term funding is being sought)
- York's submission of a Canada Research Chair Equity, Diversity and Inclusivity action plan
- the value of collegial participation in consultations leading to approval of the next iteration of York's Strategic Research Plan
- contributions of \$175,000 to the United Way placing York in the top flight of GTA workplaces -- thanks to a campaign led by Provost Philipps and Dean Sossin and the generosity
- a series of changes to the University Procedures for Decanal Searches responding to collegial input including the possibility of an open (but still confidential) phase in which Faculty Councils will have an opportunity to meet short-listed candidates if they agree to such a forum.

She addressed questions and comments about negotiations between the University and CUPE 3903, and responded to concerns about the connections between the Chamber of Commerce and the Council of Ontario Universities.

The monthly "Kudos" report on the achievements of members of the York community can be accessed with other documentation for the meeting.

Senate Committee Member Elections

Senate acclaimed a candidate recommended by Senate Executive to serve on the Appeals Committee. The Executive Committee also reported that Julie Allen had been

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elected by e-vote as the contract faculty member of Academic Standards, Curriculum and Pedagogy.

Senate Policy Approval

Senate approved a recommendation of the Academic Standards, Curriculum and Pedagogy Committee to establish a *Senate Policy on Academic Accommodations for Students' Religious Observances* effective 1 July 2018. Approval of a separate and expanded policy entailed amendments to the *Senate Policy on Sessional Dates and the Scheduling of Examinations*. ASCP also provided Senate with Guidelines and Procedures to implement the policy.

- a substantial November update on Markham Centre planning facilitated by the Provost and Vice-Provost Academic
- the status of the "Tracking Progress Through Indicators" project launched in January 2017 which has reached a stage where, it is hoped, colleagues will assist in an effort to develop "incomparable" metrics and participate in the gathering of information that will depict the full range of research and creative activity
- timelines for the final phases of the Strategic Research Plan renewal led by the Vice-President Research and Innovation
- a preliminary progress report on collegial efforts to plan for the creation of a new Faculty approved in principle by Senate in June

In November Senate approved, in principle, changes to the University grading scheme. ASCP furnished details on the status of the initiative along with the steps necessary prior to its recommending full approval of a new framework.
