#### 1. Call to Order and Approval of Agenda

The Chair of Council called the meeting to order.

It was moved, seconded, and carried to approve the agenda.

#### 2. Chair of Council's Remarks

The Chair welcomed everyone to the 41<sup>st</sup> meeting of Faculty Council.

The Chair outlined the items on the Agenda that were to be discussed and noted that a special presentation would be made by Provost Rhonda Lenton on the topic of the Decanal Search.

The Chair also mentioned that the Senate Synopsis was available to all members at the front of the room for their review.

#### 3. Minutes of the September 11, 2014, Meeting

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the minutes of the October 9, 2014, meeting of Council be approved.

#### 4. Business Arising from the Minutes

There was none.

#### 5. Dean's Remarks

Dean Singer thanked everyone for attending the meeting, and began by detailing the events of his recent trip to China and India on behalf of York University and the Faculty. He mentioned that the trip had five interrelated objectives: undergraduate student recruitment; university partnerships to promote collaborative teaching and research; study abroad opportunities; alumni outreach; and fundraising initiatives.

In terms of recruitment, he reported that he had made presentations to about 2,500 students at ten secondary schools, participated in the Beijing University Fair, and met with 250 parents of students already studying at York or thinking of studying at York. He also met with colleagues from twelve universities to initiate or further collaboration and participated in successful alumni events in China and India. Dean Singer reported that he was pleased with the results of the trip and with the increasingly high regard in which York and LA&PS are held.

In response to a letter that had been circulated to Senate members while he was away, Dean Singer then briefly provided information regarding international student enrolment and the positive impact it has had on the Faculty. When the Faculty set out to increase international student enrolment, there was a desire to create a more global environment for students and faculty. As we became more successful, it has become clearer that international student enrolment is also a significant source of revenue and a source of highly qualified students in a time of decreasing domestic enrollment.

Dean Singer introduced the Year-In Review Report 13-14, which focuses on our international efforts, and mentioned that copies were available at the front of the room.

Regarding the Academic and Administrative Program Review (AAPR) Task Force Report, Dean Singer commended the four colleagues from our Faculty who sat on this Task Force. In his personal view, he believes that it represents a substantial effort and

contribution and provides us with an opportunity to pursue our Faculty's strategic planning commitment to academic excellence. Dean Singer also pointed out that, when the new budget model becomes available, it will provide additional perspectives on the Faculty's operations.

Moving forward, he said that he will be meeting unit-by-unit with the Faculty's Chairs and Directors, (together with their respective Graduate Program Directors and Undergraduate Program Directors) and with College Masters and that twenty-one meetings have been scheduled from now until mid-December to discuss how the task force report's recommendations impact our programs. In the second phase, they will begin discussing common academic priorities, interests and concerns. In the third phase, an appropriate response will be drafted. Dean Singer stressed that it was beneficial to focus discussion on the thirty-three recommendations and to use this as an opportunity to build on academic excellence, as well as a platform to advance our Faculty's strategic goals and objectives.

In response, several Faculty Council members outlined their concerns to the Dean, which they characterized as the flawed process by which the results were derived and the unclear methodologies used. Rhonda Lenton, VP Academic & Provost, was asked by the Dean whether she had any comments to add in addressing the concerns of Faculty Council members. She pointed out that the report can be useful in that it draws attention to some programs that may be facing challenges, and can potentially help to enhance the quality and sustainability of programs. She went on to explain that the Board of Governors was made aware that implementation cannot be completed in one year, and the goal is to close the gap between revenue and expenditures within approximately five years.

At this point in the discussion, Chair, Anne MacLennan requested a motion to move/change the order of the Agenda. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the order of the Agenda be changed.

The conversation continued with Faculty Council members. Other concerns that were raised included the first recommendation in the Task Force Report and that the lower-left quadrant programs will now likely be scrutinized even though the data is weak and/or incomplete. Members also questioned how quality can effectively be measured.

It is up to the Faculty to determine its response to the task force recommendations and observations, and the Dean expressed his

confidence that the process laid out will work to support Faculty's strategic interests and priorities.

#### 6. Question Period

There were none.

### 7.Special Presentation: Rhonda Lenton, Vice President Academic & Provost

Rhonda Lenton began her presentation by speaking about the search for the new Dean and reported that the search committee has met several times, thus far. In addition, she mentioned that a Search Consultant, Janet Wright, is advertising broadly (locally, nationally, internationally) and seeking out potential candidates on the committee's behalf. She encouraged Faculty Council members to forward their recommendations of possible candidates and to provide input on what they believe is needed for the new Dean (experience, qualifications, skills, etc.). She stated that the committee has been engaged in developing the position profile and has met with various groups to receive their comments. The goal is to finalize the position profile as soon as possible because the advertisement is currently out and people are expressing interest.

Faculty Council members offered their perspective regarding the position profile for the new Dean and, more specifically, that it touches on collegiality, but does not refer to the colleges. Provost Lenton responded that the position profile has been edited to include colleges and greater reference to contract faculty and to the importance of having a strong understanding of how to work in a unionized environment. In response to a question about how the various responsibilities and qualities might be weighted in the consideration of candidates, she indicated that it is unlikely that candidates would meet all of the criteria but some will be considered imperative; the committee would welcome input on this.

Provost Lenton closed by re-emphasizing the desire to receive input from the Faculty and outlining the process by which the search committee will engage in reaching its recommendation to the President on new Dean in the months to come.

#### 8. Reports of Standing Committees of Council

#### a) Executive

The Vice Chair of Council announced the three items for information included in this month's Executive Report:

- Election Results: Council Standing Committees;
- •Election Results: LA&PS Contract Faculty Representatives on Senate: and
- General Education Sub-Committee.

She began by congratulating all members who were elected or acclaimed as representatives on Faculty Council, Standing Committees of Council, and Senate. She also thanked all members who allowed their names to stand for nomination and for their willingness to serve.

She then encouraged members to nominate themselves or others to the committees, and said that we are still looking for members to serve on the Tenure and Promotions Committee, and five members to serve on the Committee on Student Academic Petitions.

The Vice Chair asked if there were any nominations from the floor for the Standing Committees of Council.

There were no nominations.

It was moved, seconded, and carried to close the nominations for the Standing Committees of Council.

The Vice Chair asked if there were any nominations from the floor for Contract Faculty Representatives on Senate.

There were no nominations.

It was moved, seconded, and carried to close the nominations for Contract Faculty Representatives on Senate.

Next, as an item for information, the Vice Chair brought to Council's attention the creation of a General Education Sub-Committee, which will soon begin to review general education courses.

The Vice Chair asked if there were any nominations from the floor for the General Education Sub-Committee.

There were no nominations.

It was moved, seconded, and carried to close the nominations for the General Education Sub-Committee.

The Vice Chair stated that the election results will be reported at the December 4, 2014, Faculty Council meeting.

There were no questions following the Executive Committee Report.

#### b) Curriculum, Curricular Policy and Standards

The Chair called upon Professor A. Weiss as Chair of the Committee to deliver the report.

Professor Weiss stated that the Committee wished to report one item for information.

Item for information: Professor Weiss provided an update regarding concerns raised to approve courses. He mentioned that, at the CR Sub-Committee, there is a problem with new forms for new course proposals and it is important to consult with other departments to make sure that a new course does not overlap with courses run elsewhere.

#### 9. Other Business for Which Due Notice Has Been Given
